Interested in secondary analyses of addiction-related health services data? Announcing a free CRISM | Prairies service

CRISM | Prairies has partnered with the <u>Alberta Addiction and Mental Health Research Partnership</u>

<u>Program</u> and the <u>Addictions & Mental Health Strategic Clinical Network</u> of Alberta Health Services and invites Prairie Node members with an interest in secondary analyses of addiction-related health services data to access this new initiative. The partnership offers a dedicated Masters-level analyst to access AHS data holdings for CRISM | Prairie members. Approved projects can address research, evaluation, quality improvement, and measurement questions related to substance misuse through this free service.

Rationale

- CRISM | Prairies has partnered with Alberta Health Services (Alberta Addiction and Mental Health Research Partnership Program and the Addiction and Mental Health Strategic Clinical Network) to promote innovation in analytics related to substance use and health care utilization.
- The long-term goal of this partnership is to support access to addiction and mental health (AMH)
 client data from relevant health care services and programs in Alberta Health Services (AHS) for
 researchers and to promote innovative analytic projects.

Purpose

- The overarching purpose is to identify and address mutually agreed upon and mutually beneficial research, evaluation, quality improvement and measurement questions.
- CRISM | Prairies has funded a full time analyst to work in the AHS Knowledge, Performance and Integrated Planning program. Projects will be categorized as follows:
 - Analysis of well-developed research, evaluation, measurement, or quality improvement questions using administrative health data
 - Consultation around development of question

Projects are eligible for this service using the following criteria

- No primary data collection
- The project makes use of data already held in AHS or AH data repositories
- The project proposal must align with CRISM objectives or AHS priorities, or both
- Preference will be given to projects in the following order:
 - Aligns with both CRISM objectives and AHS priorities
 - Aligns with CRISM or AHS with some overlap with the other agency

Submit the completed application to ResearchPartnership@albertahealthservices.ca Applications are reviewed by a joint CRISM | Praries and AHS governance committee.

SAMHSA Treatment Guidance on Native Populations

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is issuing a Treatment Improvement Protocol (TIP) to improve access by American Indians and Alaska Natives to treatment for substance use disorders that is scientifically sound and culturally informed.

TIP 61 "Behavioral Health Services for American Indians and Alaska Natives" furthers SAMHSA's mission to advance the behavioral health of the nation and improve the lives of individuals living with mental and substance use disorders, and their families. The guidance provided through TIP 61 offers the behavioral health field practical and culturally relevant approaches for delivering effective behavioral health services to American Indian and Alaska Native clients.

Consolidating Perspectives on Saskatoon's Opioid Crisis Final Project Report Released

Led by Principle Investigator Dr. Lori Hanson and Co-Investigator Dr. Peter Butt at the University of Saskatchewan, the aim of the *Consolidating Perspectives* study was to bring information and perspectives together regarding the evolving opioid crisis in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

CIHR Team Grant: Cannabis Research In Priority Areas



projects to catalyze future research related to the health impacts of cannabis legalization. That catalyst grant funding opportunity had a specific focus on population health intervention research related to the legalization and regulation of non-medical cannabis in Canada. Further, in July 2018, CIHR and partners invested \$3 million to support an additional 24 projects designed to address urgent priority areas identified through a research priorities workshop held in September 2017. Identified research areas included both the potential therapeutic benefit for specific indications and the potential risks/harms of cannabis use in different populations. However, there still remain many unknowns about the health and safety effects of cannabis, as well as the behavioural, social, ethical and economic implications of legalization.

To address these issues, CIHR and partner agencies have developed an Integrated Cannabis Research Strategy (ICRS). The overarching vision of ICRS is to provide a well-coordinated series of activities to position Canada as a leader in developing the research capacity and amassing the research evidence needed on the effects of cannabis. This includes validating the potential therapeutic benefits of cannabis, as well as understanding risks and harms, and supporting policy and regulatory models for studying cannabis use (including development of common data standards). This Team Grant funding opportunity represents the first targeted funding opportunity launched under ICRS, with additional opportunities planned in the coming years.

The purpose of the current Team Grant is to explore in more detail the potential therapeutic benefits and harms associated with cannabis use in a number of targeted areas identified through previous consultations. In particular, these Team Grants will address stakeholder priorities by supporting specific defined priority areas in targeted pools, to strengthen the evidence base and to build cannabis-related research capacity.

Letter of intent is due May 15 2019.
