The Alberta Addiction and Mental Health Research Partnership Program and the Addictions & Mental Health Strategic Clinical Network of Alberta Health Services have partnered with CRISM | Prairies. This partnership will address research, evaluation, quality improvement, and measurement questions related to substance misuse.

This analytic and research collaboration is opening up administrative data on substance use and is creating a line of sight between applied knowledge generation and research activity. The long-term goals of this partnership are to support researcher access to addiction and mental health client data from acute and specialty health care services and programs, and to promote innovation in analytics.



Resource: CCSA & CISUR Canadian Substance Use Costs and Harms (2007-2014)





Evidence. Engagement. Impact.

In June 2018, Canadian Centre on Substance Use and Addiction (CCSA) and the University of Victoria's Canadian Institute for Substance Use Research (CISUR) released a new report, <u>Canadian Substance</u> <u>Use Costs and Harms (2007–2014)</u>, covering a broad range of substances including alcohol, tobacco, cannabis, opioids and central nervous system (CNS) depressants, cocaine and CNS stimulants, and other substances such as hallucinogens and inhalants.

Providing national, provincial and territorial estimates for the cost and harms of substance use between 2007 and 2014, the study estimates the total cost of substance in Canada in 2014 at \$38.4 billion. Alcohol and tobacco use contributed over two thirds of these costs, while opioids ranked a distant third.
